Until the fall of 2006 I was one of four Eagle Advancement Committee members of Pioneer District of Lincoln Heritage Council of Louisville, KY. Over the past 8 years I had the pleasure of assisting Scoutmasters with their Life Scouts making the Eagle rank. I evaluated 52 Eagle Proposals and sat on 44 Eagle Boards of Review. Moreover, I served as Scoutmaster of Troop 147 for 10 years, and before that I was Cubmaster of Pack 147. Being part of this District, I also served as Chairman of several Fall and Winter District Camporees and Merit Badge Fairs. There are other events too numerous to mention. As a former Scoutmaster, I well remember the uncertainties I once had of the procedures in assisting Life Scouts with the formulation and completion of their Eagle Projects and all the required paperwork dictated by the district, council, and national office. Therefore, I have put together a guide that I believe will assist Scoutmasters, other leaders, and the Life Scouts in attaining the rank of Eagle. Through research, I have learned that most Boy Scout Councils and their Districts go about the process in about the same way. However, I was not able to find documentation that specifically outlined each and every step of this process and which specifically listed all the documentation that this affords. I have made use of my Councils web site (<http://www.lhcbasa.org/>) and have made it accessible for you to download several required documents in PDF form. You will also have to substitute the names of your Council and District for the ones I have listed. I hope that you will find that this guideline offers a consistent approach that if followed will eliminate so many confusing approaches to the process. The biggest problem appeared to be the completion of the Eagle Scout Leadership Project Workbook, No. 18-927A, giving many leaders problems. There was considerable ambiguity in deciding exactly what the Reviewers of the Proposals might want included. Some wanted more detail in one part and not in another. For example, some insisted on letters of need for a project whereas some did not. Sections 1 and 2 of this guide address all the concerns in the Workbook with examples and clarification for the Life Scout and Scoutmaster. Also, I have purposely omitted any reference to NESAs (National Eagle Scout Association) or any possible scholarship that may arise from a Scout earning Eagle. I leave this up to the Scoutmasters and other leaders to cover this with the Eagle candidate. The Lincoln Heritage Council gives its permission for you to duplicate and use any of its forms. INTRODUCTION A girl must be a Second Class Scout before receiving a Merit Badge in any subject. However, this does not mean that she cannot begin to study her subject and plan for passing the test at any time. Proficiency in these tests is to be determined by the Local Council, or by persons competent (in the opinion of the Council) to judge it. If no Local Council exists, certificates should be secured from persons competent to judge each subject, such as teachers of music, dancing or drawing, riding masters, motorists, electricians, milliners, dressmakers, artists, craftsmen, scientists and so forth. These certificates should be sent to the National Headquarters or to the nearest District Headquarters for inspection. Headquarters will either pass on these, or indicate the nearest local body competent to deal with them. The tests as given are topical outlines of what a Scout should know about the subject rather than formal questions. Captains and others giving the tests will adapt the wording to the needs of the particular case. With many subjects a list of standard references is given. It is desirable that a girl should read at least one of these books, not in order to pass an examination but that she may be familiar with the general field and the great names and principles associated with it. Where a whole troop is working on a subject, portions of the books may be read at troop meetings, or several Scouts can read together and discuss their Impressions. In 1899 while serving in the 2nd Boer War, Robert Baden-Powell penned his sixth military book, *Aids To Scouting*. It was a non-typical training manual filled with personal stories of intrigue and even games. Its goal was to encourage the development of light reconnaissance scouting skills within the British Army. The book was well received by various armies of its time, including the French Army. His successful defense of Mafeking (1899-1900) in South Africa made Baden-Powell a well-known national hero in Britain. But what completely surprised Baden-Powell was that his book was eagerly taken up by teachers and youth groups to help organize outdoor activities and sport. He eventually embraced the idea of adapting his work into a new youth-oriented book, *Scouting for Boys* (1908) which went on to sell approx. 150 million copies to date. It was that follow-on book that firmly launched the international Boy Scouts movement. *Aids to Scouting* contains sections on the characters of a scout, as well as practical advice on observation, stealth/camouflage, map reading, sketching, tracking, reporting and care of horses.
